Hi everyone! How's your 梅雨 (tsuyu - rainy season) going? One thing that seems to have been cropping up a lot lately is the idea of a sharp difference in perspective – how something that seems perfectly ordinary to one person can seem absolutely incredible to another. For example, I was in a building recently that had a robot security quard (although I must admit, at first I thought it was a robot floor-polisher). I turned to the person next to me and said "Wow - Japan really is an advanced country for robotics, huh!" They looked puzzled, and asked "Oh, is it?" They'd never been outside of Japan, so assumed everywhere else in the world has similar technology. On a similar note, I never use my smartphone when I'm on the train (and particularly on the underground) because where I come from, technology hasn't advanced enough to provide underground signal boosters (or even a decent mobile network, if I'm honest), so it's not possible!
