An Englishman in Miyazaki

"Spring Forward, Fall Back..."

Hi everyone! I'm sure you've all noticed how it's started getting a little cooler in the evenings lately. This can mean only one thing: autumn is here, and it's brought with it the annual tide of pretty coloured leaves and desire for kuri (chestnuts) and yaki-imo (baked potatoes) that remind me of back home, since they're time-honoured methods of staving off the cold this time of year. There's one particular thing that happens every autumn in the UK that somehow still manages to catch me out, though – everyone puts their clocks back an hour, which means it doesn't get dark quite so early in the evenings. Most years, it also means that I wake up an hour earlier than I need to, since I completely forgot to change the time on my clock before I went to bed. You'd think I'd be used to it by now...

The clocks go forward again in the spring, which is why people use the phrase in the title of this column as a mnemonic to help them remember which way to adjust the clock – which also got me thinking about how different languages come up with phrases to remember things: for example, in English, to remember the order of the colours in the rainbow, they take the first letters (Red, Orange, Yellow, Green, Blue, Indigo, Violet) and make a little phrase that uses them – "Richard Of York Gave Battle In Vain," which relates to British history, so they used to teach it in schools. Japanese also has a particularly long one to remember the reign names and order of all the Emperors of Japan (I'm afraid I don't have space to fit it all in this column, but ask a Japanese person nearby and see if they can remember it all the way through!) – does anyone know any good mnemonics like that from other languages?
