### An Englishman in Miyazaki

"Breaking a Duck"

Hi everyone! Hope you're all keeping well. If you're not familiar with the idiom I used in the title this month, don't worry, it's not literal - it comes from an old cricket term from a couple of hundred years ago, where "a duck's egg" was the name given to a score of zero (since a zero looks a bit like an egg – it's the same reason you say "love" for a score of zero in tennis; it comes from the French "l'oeuf."), so to break one is to end a long non-scoring streak. The reason I use it here is because I recently broke a 14 year streak of not being able to go to the cinema – I love movies, but hadn't had the time to go and see one on the big screen for years! One major difference between watching a movie here in Japan and back home (besides the fact that it's actually quiet enough to concentrate on the film over here - people in the UK have an awful habit of talking during movies!) is that in Japan, the lights stay off until the credits have finished. Back in the UK, a lot of people get up and leave while the credits are rolling.

Do you have anything you always used to love but have been too busy to do for a long time? If so, make sure to take the time to get back to it! I guarantee you'll find you enjoy it all the more for having been away from it.
