

A Report from Taiwan



At the beginning of last year, when the COVID-19 pandemic started, the alcohol sanitizer and masks at pharmacies and drugstores quickly disappeared. However, thanks to the efforts of the Government and the private sector, the supply of alcohol sanitizer was soon became restored, and masks could be purchased through a system using health insurance cards. The Government has taken many measures against COVID-19, such as restricting access to airports, stipulating social distancing, and announcing daily reports of confirmed cases and the movements of infected people. One of the things I have found most useful is the "疫管家" LINE account. In addition to providing information on how to help prevent the spread of the disease, this account announces the number of confirmed cases and the status of the spread of infection that day, which are announced at a press conference held by the Command Center (also known as the Central Epidemic and Epidemic Information Center) every afternoon, so that the public can be clearly informed and kept up to date. One of the most difficult things for me to get used to at first was having to wear a mask on public transportation such as the MRT (the train that runs through Taipei) and buses because the mask would fog up my glasses. Gradually, however, I got used to wearing a mask everywhere I went.

Gradually, however, I got used to wearing a mask everywhere I went. From December 1, 2020, it became a requirement to wear masks in eight locations (medical and care-related facilities, public transportation, living and shopping facilities, education and learning facilities, venues, leisure and entertainment facilities, and religious and festival-related facilities). Failure to comply results in a fine of not less than NT\$3,000(about ¥10,900) and not more than NT\$15,000 (about ¥54,700). While many people comply with the preventative regulations put in place, there are others who do not cooperate, such as those who do not listen when told to wear masks on the MRT, or those who do not follow the quarantine regulations upon returning to the country and walk around everywhere in public. These unruly examples are not only acts of personal selfishness, but also put the people themselves and others in danger. The fight against COVID-19 requires the efforts on the part of each and every one of us. I hope that the days of having to wear a mask every day will soon be over and the world will return to normal.

The book has been translated into sixteen languages, including English and Japanese, and has been read in many countries around the world. Hi everyone! Hope you're all keeping well. For a bit of a change this month, I thought it might be interesting to look at something old and English (presumably out of some kind of resonance...) - have you ever heard William Blake's poem "And Did Those Feet in Ancient Time" from the start of the 19th century? Along with Land of Hope and Glory, it's often sung as the national anthem for England at international sporting events. (Unlike Ireland and Wales, England doesn't actually have an official anthem, so they also often use the UK's national anthem, God Save the Queen). People who don't like the monarchy in the UK (as well as King George V, interestingly) also often prefer it because, rather than venerating the royal family, it sings about England's natural beauty and working hard to build a paradise on Earth. It's often said that the original poem was also protesting the destruction of nature and human relationships in the name of progress during the industrial revolution. I know it's not exactly BTS or anything, but there's some interesting national, cultural and human history to be found there if you fancy checking it out. What about your own countries?
