Hi everyone! I hope you're all keeping well and staying out of the cold!

Looking back over previous columns, I've spoken before about the differences in how we celebrate February 14<sup>th</sup> in the UK versus here in Japan, but as it approaches, I remembered something amusing that happened to me last year on Valentine's Day that might be worth sharing - I got given some posh chocolates with shochu inside (we all know what they say about the way to a man's heart being through the stomach via the liver), which was a lovely sentiment, plus the place that made them was closing down, so the gesture felt all the more special because it could never be repeated, but the shochu used for the filling was none other than 百年の孤 独 - Hyakunen no kodoku...

On the one hand, that's a great thing, because it's a rare, aged shochu with a wonderful flavour that pairs fantastically well with dark chocolate. But on the other hand, the name literally translates to "one hundred years of loneliness." hundred years of loneliness!
