A Scot in Miyazaki

"Glaswegian"



So it's been about a month and a half since I came to Miyazaki, and slowly but surely I think I'm getting used to it. A few weeks ago, I had some of my first school visits, which ended up being really fun (I hope for both me and the students!) One of the things I like to introduce when I give talks at the schools in Miyazaki is the difference between different parts of the UK. A common mistake made by lots of people in Japan is that the South of England is representative of all of the UK. In order to explain the differences in culture between the northern and southern parts of the UK, I try to teach the kids different UK accents, the one I know most about obviously being my own, the Glaswegian accent.

The Glasgow accent is not only very distinctive within Scotland, but most people from the UK can recognise it when they hear it. We say 'ken' instead of 'know', 'belter' instead of 'good', and 'baltic' instead of 'cold'. Anything that's remotely small requires the prefix 'wee', and when asked a question we say 'how' instead of 'why'. 'Aye' means 'yes', and we end all our sentences in 'but', even though grammatically it makes no sense. If you 'havnae a scooby' (not

got a clue) what I'm talking about, look up a TV show called 'Still Game', it's set in Glasgow, so I'm sure you'll see what I mean.

Accents can make language learning challenging, especially when you're trying to teach others your language. But language learning and teaching is also all about exposure. Although my accent has become diluted since I've lived away from home for a few years, it comes back whenever I go home. I look forward to meeting more people and learning about their accents and teaching them more about mine!
