#### A Scot in Miyazaki

#### "Hogmanay"

As I'm sure everyone knows, or maybe will find out soon, the biggest celebration in winter in Japan is お正月 'oshougatsu', aka New Year's. In Japan, New Year is that time when people go home to see their families. whereas for many of us that might usually be Christmas. Yet, in Scotland, New Year also has a special significance.

Did you know that in Scotland we have a different name for New Year's celebrations? I mean, of course, we call the 31st of December 'New Year's Eve', but we Scots also call it 'Hogmanay'. Hogmanay is Scots for the last day of the old year and is synonymous with the celebration of the New Year in the Scottish manner. Normally followed by further celebration on the morning of New Year's Day, Hogmanay marks the arrival of the new year. The origins of Hogmanay, however, remain unclear, but it is thought to be derived from Norse and Gaelic observances of the winter solstice. Social customs vary throughout households in Scotland, but usually include

gift-giving, visiting the homes of friends and neighbours, and just generally spending time with your loved ones. Scotland's Hogmanay celebrations guarantee a warm, if not slightly rowdy, welcoming of the new year and at midnight, we set off fireworks and sing 'Auld Lang Syne'. For those spending their first New Year's in Japan, I hope you will be able to indulge in the Japanese traditions and culture. Although I am excited to spend this year in Japan, I may still have to sing 'Auld Lang Syne' at the stroke of midnight!
