

Confessions of a scaredy-cat





"Ode to the Street Piano"

Let me tell you about the first friend I made in Miyazaki: the Street Piano.

I have a sixth sense for public pianos, and it wasn't long into my time here before I found this one, a slightly battered upright painted sky-blue with childlike illustrations sitting in the courtyard of the Art Centre on San-chome. I'm the definition of an amateur when it comes to music: I love doing it, I only play songs I like and can figure out by ear, and I like to show off but balk at any kind of professional performance. That's why public pianos are so irresistible to me, they take the pressure off. I've visited that piano countless times now, sometimes to play, and sometimes just to listen.

The musical pleasures alone would be enough, but I also have to thank the Street Piano for something more important, which is getting me to talk to Miyazaki residents. In the past I've found it hard to put myself out there in a new place, especially a Japanese



one, but my first impression of disarming Miyazaki friendliness was at the Street Piano, talking to a chatty elderly pianist in my first week living in the city. I've since made a few "piano friends", people who gravitate to that place just like I do and who are happy to hang out and chat while we take turns on the keys. And music is a shared language in itself; I'm always able to find at least some common ground with people over a piano, no matter their age or nationality (usually "Let It Be" by The Beatles). I take comfort knowing that piano's there, that I can walk ten minutes to it from my home, and that I'll most likely leave it feeling less alone than when I came.
